Dear Friends in Christ,

One of my favorite books in the Bible for inspirational and devotional reading is The Book of Psalms. Many of the psalms were written by King David. His life was filled with not only innumerable joys, but also long seasons of great loss, suffering and adversity.

It is interesting what will come to mind when you are reading God's Word. Because God's Word is His *LIVING* Word – inspired by the Holy Spirit – Always pray before you read. Ask God the Holy Spirit: “What do You want to teach me today? ... What do You want to Show me today?” **And as you read ...and Listen ... God will speak to you!**

We read in Psalm 37:1, **“Fret not yourself because of evil doers.”** Do you ever find yourself **“Fretting?”** I must confess that I often find myself “Fretting” after listening to the evening news. I also must confess that I love to listen to the news! But I am also aware that I often find myself **“Fretting”** after watching or listening to the news. Please understand that I try to use a filter when listening. It goes something like this: “What if ONLY 50% of what I have just heard is True?” Yes ... I still find myself **“Fretting!”**

After reading Psalm 37:1, I wrote in my Bible next to verse 1, this word to myself: “Listening to the evening news!” I needed God's Word to re-focus my heart and mind and feelings! I needed the Holy Spirit to speak God's Word of Hope and Promise and Peace and Sovereignty into my life.

It is not only GOD's Word that brings Peace back into my life. It is the powerful words of great hymns. This month I will share one of my favorite hymns with you. I know that God speaks to my heart as I meditate on its words. I pray that He will also speak His Word of Love and Peace and Assurance to yours as well. The hymn is no doubt familiar to many of you. It was written by Horatio Spafford.

When peace, like a river, attendeth my way,
 When sorrows like sea billows roll;
Whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say,
 It is well, it is well with my soul.

Though Satan should buffet, though trials should come,
 Let this blest assurance control,
That Christ hath regarded my helpless estate,
 And hath shed His own blood for my soul.

He lives—oh, the bliss of this glorious thought!—
 My sin, not in part but the whole,
Is nailed to His cross, and I bear it no more,
 Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, O my soul!

For me, be it Christ, be it Christ hence to live:
 If Jordan above me shall roll,
No pang shall be mine, for in death as in life
 Thou wilt whisper Thy peace to my soul.

Lord, hasten the day when our faith shall be sight,
 The clouds be rolled back as a scroll;
The trumpet shall sound, and the Lord shall descend,
 Even so, it is well with my soul.

John worked 70 hours a week. He loved his job and brought home a sizeable pay-check to provide good things for his family. He always had plans to slow down but he never did. One evening he came home with great news—he had been promoted to the highest position in his company. But no one was home. Over the years, his children had grown up and moved out, his wife had found a career of her own, and now the house was empty. There was no one to share the good news with.

Wise King Solomon talked about the need to keep a balance in life with our work. He wrote, “Fools fold their hands and ruin themselves” (Eccl. 4:5). We don’t want to go to the extreme of being lazy, but neither do we want to fall into the trap of being a workaholic. “Better one handful with tranquility than two handfuls with toil and chasing after the wind” (v. 6). In other words, it is better to have less and enjoy it more. Sacrificing relationships at the altar of success is unwise. Achievement is fleeting, while relationships are what make our life meaningful, rewarding, and enjoyable (vv. 7-12).

The LORD can give us this wisdom as we seek Him and trust Him to be our Provider. We can learn to **work to live and not live to work** by choosing to apportion our time wisely. The Lord can give us this wisdom as we seek Him and trust Him to be our Provider.

Listen and measure your life by this Word from your Lord Jesus:

Luke 9:23-26

And Jesus said to all, “If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will save it. For what does it profit a man if he gains the whole world and loses or forfeits himself? For whoever is ashamed of me and of my words, of him will the Son of Man be ashamed when he comes in his glory and the glory of the Father and of the holy angels.

and where I need to make changes.**

FIRST ENGLISH LUTHERAN CHURCH
CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING
Tuesday July 14, 2020

PRESENT (virtually) : *Mike Anderson; Chris Cichanowicz; Ted Ellis; Dan Obrynba; Cindy Russell; Alicia Schulz. (in person) Gary Lane, Jan Fisher, Tom Sarbach, Mary Schwartz; Lowell Weeks. Excused: Lana Conry, Kathy Hoecker, Todd Heichel, Pastor Paul Larson*

Meeting called to order and opened with prayer by Lowell Weeks.

Reports:

Secretary: Roll was taken. Motion (Chris/Dan) to approve the minutes of the June 14 Council meeting. **Motion carried.** Alicia reported on a “thank you” from New Hope for the Dickson Fund monies.

Senior Pastor: (none)(vacation)

Vice President: Dan suggested that, at the forthcoming, delayed annual meeting, we present something in the way of a “State of the Church” address. A list of presenters would review the status of our visioning process and progress and present brief updates of various developments such as the blended services, expanded role of Becky Pittman, the search for a youth leader, the ELC and attainment of 5 Star status, the bus, our website and technology team, the Dickson fund, interim pastor team, etc. The possible topics and presenters were discussed. – Nicole Goddard has become invaluable and it is proposed that we officially expand her responsibilities. Todd is aware of this need and it is suggested that he ask Nicole what she thinks she can or would be willing to do. May need to consider the issue of bonding and the office of treasurer. – We need Pastor Larson’s calendar for the remainder of the year. – We need Pastor Larson to compile a list of all records in his possession and at the church, especially those matters that are not well or commonly known and help us become familiar with what we need to know.

Personnel: (Todd written) Will have a report next month as meetings and projects are in the works.

- On a separate note: The new recording/streaming equipment has been incredibly helpful and useful. Even as we are “learning the ropes,” it has been drastically more efficient than our previous endeavors. We still have a few “kinks” to workout, especially on the audio side of things, but it is progressing. We’ve been able to capture audio via a line from the board, which has improved the overall quality. However, additional resources are needed to properly mic the drum kit as well as the organ. - We are currently streaming to Facebook live Sunday mornings and then uploading the recording to our YouTube channel following the service. Unfortunately, we do not have enough YouTube subscribers to stream live to our channel. - According to Facebook, **from June 16 to July 13**, we have **11 new page likes**, a **post reach of 6110 people** and **post engagements of 1,678 people**. Our last two live worship services have reached **695 people (June 28)** and **700 people (July 5)**. Engagement of those posts was 107 and 92 people respectively. **Our page has been visited 313 times in the last 28 days with 13 new followers, and five click-throughs to our website.** - Speaking of our website, I’d like to research the possibility of live streaming there as well.

Finance: Ted reported that giving is up \$6700 over budget. The ELC opened in June on a limited basis, its revenue is coming up but we don’t expect to make money this year. Expenses are \$49,000 over budget.

ELC: Staff and Enrollment: Current Staff numbers stand at 3 Administrators and 15 teachers. There are 63 children currently enrolled and attending. - **Bus** - We have purchased a new bus From Creative Bus Sales. Total final cost was \$28,466.50. The new (to us) unit is currently undergoing a complete inspection and has had a few items Identified that needed repaired before delivery. Parts were ordered early the week of June 29th and the repairs are expected to be completed by the end of the week of July 15th (depending on delivery of parts). Once those repairs are complete the bus will be delivered to FELC from Chino, CA. Upon delivery, We will take the new bus for it’s ODOT inspection and have it licensed for use by the church. Title work, pre-delivery inspection, any repairs as a result of the inspection, and delivery of the bus were included in the purchase price. Nicole Goddard has reported to me that the monies have been distributed accordingly, and now we are just waiting for delivery. **Grant Monies** - Once again, we are grateful for the tenacity and resourcefulness of our director when it comes to finding sources of funding! Angie Murphy applied for, and received a grant totaling \$16,012.00 to aid in offsetting expenses incurred due to response to

the (insert your name of choice for the Covid-19 virus) response mandates. The money was put to good use on the following;

- 3 portable sinks (1 will go in the shed), gloves, toilet paper, paper towels, soap, art supplies, manipulatives for classrooms, past payroll, plates, cups, napkins, plastic silverware, signs for parking lot, new washer and dryer, pressure washer, 3 canopies, touchless trashcans

Summer Olympics - Summer Olympic Games the week of July 13th. The Luther Hall parking lot will be closed 8:30-11:30, Friday July 17th. There will be a closing ceremony in the Mulberry Street lot, with parents staying in their cars. Jan Fisher got a Thrivent card for Veggie Tales video for each ELC family plus a take home meal for the night. - A special thank you to Becky Pittman for continuing to provide a solid music program for our students!

Evangelism: (Jan) At our drive-through produce distribution today we served 167 households, of that number 117 were seniors, 215 were adults (18 to 59), and 108 were children. This equates to 440 individuals in these households. According to the computer program there were 78 new families. I'm always surprised by that. The produce boxes were premium quality and if you had to a value on them I would guess \$35.00 to \$40.00 worth of produce. Equally great was the dairy: gallon chocolate milk, gallon of white milk, pound of butter, ricotta cheese in tubs, cottage cheese, large container of yogurt, and two bags of shredded cheese. Totally amazing, along with a frozen meat product which was pasta with pork and sauce. We ran out at 12:15 and I had to explain that to a number of people who came by around 12:30. – If you remember that we filled out yellow sheets with member contact information, Angie is working on a (non-picture) directory which should be ready soon. One frustration is the fact that we don't have Pew Pads to note names and addresses. We have consistently had two lovely ladies visiting for worship, and I know their first names but cannot send them a note, etc. because I don't have complete information. I'm looking forward to being able to track people better in the near future. - I tried to contact Lind Media to see when/where our billboard will be displayed next. As of Friday PM, no response.

WORSHIP: Cindy reported that we will have communion on July 26.

Christian Ed: (Kathy written)_Sunday School hopes to begin, again , as usual but Amy is unsure at the moment what thus will look like due to Covid. Some classes may need to find new rooms as ELC has had to make some room changes. No news as to “new” SS sessions starting up. Also unsure regarding Confirmation and Communion Instruction. Hopefully more to come.

Global Missions: (Chris) Christophersons: The devastation from the fire they had last month left them filled with tears of grief and healing. Praise God they had insurance to cover the loss of their home and they were not hurt. Their daughter and her husband will be coming down to help them fill a huge dumpster with all the charred items. They were fortunate to find a place to stay until the renovations are complete.They hope to move there on July 20. It could be from 6 to 9 months before they can move back into their own home. Please continue to pray for them!

Krafts: No update yet, but I believe they are still in lockdown. Unable to leave the house after 4 in the afternoons and Sundays complete lockdown. All 12 are still there as far as I know. The Krafts are asking for special prayers for their board member Kjirsten who was supposed to go home last January, but is still with them. Pray also that the borders will soon open so Anne Valerie, a young nurse, will be able to go to Bolivia as planned to help there. 5 of her relatives there have Covid.

Sorges: After the wedding of their son Joshua and Caroline, their next trip is to go to Hammond, Indiana on July 14 to celebrate Brian's Mom's 90th birthday. They are not sure what comes after their time in Hammond, but are asking God for clarity as they seek HIS guidance about the rest of their time in the U.S. The borders of the Far Side are not open yet, and their visas must be re-validated before they go back.

Malawi The orphans are still in great need of funding for food and education. They continue to only receive one meal 2 -3 times each week.

Meeting adjourned at 8:53. Next meeting: August 11, 2020, 7 p.m.

Some valuable information from the Finance Committee

Following the annual meeting, Lu Blankenship became the chairman of the Finance Committee.

Things the congregation might want to know:


- YTD expenses have been less than budgeted (Of course, some activities are limited due to the Corona Virus.
- The amount of money that can be drawn from the General Endowment Fund this year is \$135,000. We drew \$50,000 of that in March.
- The available funds for the year in the New Ministries & Missions Endowment Fund was \$15,400, of which \$4,800 was used to upgrade the system and produce a more quality worship for broadcasting and publishing it on the FELC web site.
- At the six-month mark, offerings were \$2,009 over the budget. However, in July, offerings were actually \$17,073 while the budgeted figure is \$25, 178; which meant that, at the end of July, we fell short a little over \$8,000. The good news is that offerings last July were \$14,912, so the July figure (\$17,073) is \$2,161 better than last year.

FELC is a very blessed congregation. Finance is confident that members will continue to step up with their offerings and continue the good work that is being done at and around our church.

2020 NALC Convocation Report by Greg Hughes

Since this is my first experience as a lay delegate to a national church function it seems strange and unusual that it be done virtually. It started with two different virtual meetings to discuss how to use the software and the protocol for voting and structure of the Convocation meeting over the period of two weeks. This was not my first virtual meeting experience but it was the first with hundreds of people participating!

Prior to the Convocation Meeting several proposed changes to the NALC Constitution were made in the preliminary discussions. When the Convocation started many delegates voice opinions concerning whether to hold the convocations biannually. This motion passed by one vote.

After hours of discussions the proposed constitutional changes were postponed to next year when it hopefully will be held in-person in Corpus Christi, Texas. This was done because a majority of delegates felt it was important to be able to have face-to-face communication on the issues.

Bishop Selbo addressed the meeting and presented a new bold plan, entitled 2020 Vision, for the next four years. First he gave a brief update on the growth of the NALC. The North American Lutheran Church is now ten years old. Since its inception we have grown from 17 congregations to close to 450 in 36 Mission Districts! Now the challenge is to create 40 new congregations in the next four years.

The growth of the NALC has presented issues with the structure of the church leadership. Bishop Selbo has proposed the creation of regional bishops to handle the workload currently done by one person.

The emphasis of the 2020 Vision is to encourage one-on-one witnessing using the gifts of the Holy Spirit and adhering to the Great Commission.

The bishop also emphasized that all pastors be allowed to train every year. In the next few years 300 pastors are eligible for retirement. We currently are struggling to ordain enough new pastors each year to replace those who retire.

He proposes that we encourage middle school, high school, and young Christian adults that feel a calling to enter seminary. We need to involve the youth in all aspects of the church! They are the future of the church!

The bishop also appealed to the church to provide more funds to finance and support the seminary and global missions (including local startup congregations).

An opportunity to share our “bounty”

This year CROP WALK will be held on Sunday, October 4, 2020. This year, much like last year’s walk, Pastor Paul Lintern is heading up Mansfield Hunger Crop Walk. It will be done virtually this year, due to COVID19.

Teams and individuals are asked to do their own walking, wherever they choose to do it. They can schedule it during any time of the day. They then get their team members and other families and friends to donate online by going to the website: www.crophunger.walk.org/MansfieldOH.

There are five Mansfield churches helping with this years’ organizing. They are: First Christian Church, Grace Episcopal, MOSAIC, St. Luke’s, and NECIC. Sandy Stout at First Christian Church and Rev. Tom Roepke at Linden Road Presbyterian Church have materials to hand out. You can donate online or if you prefer you can use an envelope (found on the poster table) designated for CROP WALK. I’m certain that most of us are aware of the food insecurity that exists these days.

Sharing is caringWe have known Henrik and Patty Christopherson for a long time and think that you might be interested in the update about their house fire where they experienced great loss. This comes from Patty.....

It's been awhile since I last sent out an update. This one has been more challenging for me to write, for some reason. Should be getting easier, don't you think?

- We met with our general contractor, Rob. Now that demo is pretty much wrapped up, he will make an assessment of what it would cost to rebuild our house the way it was: hardwood floors, crown molding and french doors, window seats in the dining rooms, along with updates to bring electric, plumbing, etc up to code. Once ServePro and State Farm come to an agreement, we will find out how much money we have to work with. Then comes the fun part. We can let our contractor know what changes we might want to make and still stay in budget. At least we think this is how it works (and I hope it will be fun). We learn as we go!
- So how are we, really? The word that best describes how I feel right now is fatigued. Though I do like the idea of starting over, *off with the old and on with the new and all that*, I find that I am getting fatigued. It actually reminds me of the first time we came home from Peru. After living overseas for 4 years where your choice was between two brands of jam (both strawberry), three brands of yogurt (again, all strawberry) and you could buy ground beef in one grocery store one day a week, we got used to a pretty simple life. Our first trip to the grocery store after coming back to the US made our brains hurt! What kind of cereal? What kind of deodorant? What kind of bread? At some point, I remember thinking, "We have enough. This is enough! I can't make any more decisions today. I will pick out soup and paper towels another day." Now, we are slowing starting from scratch again. I find myself sighing a deep, heavy sigh as I shop which tells me, "Tomorrow is another day. You can pick up soup and paper towels later. Time to go home." I am fatigued emotionally.
- Fatigue has also set in because I don't always sleep well. Normally, I fall asleep quickly and sleep through almost anything. Just one of the reasons I think it was a miracle that I woke up the night of the fire. Lately, Henrik has been working a lot of overnights as a chaplain. One night when he was gone this week, I was having a hard time relaxing enough to fall asleep. I realized it is in part an unconscious concern that if I am home alone, deeply asleep and something happens, will I wake up? It was good to name and own my fear, and to know that the same God that protected us on Chicago Avenue is here with me on Knollwood Lane. Pray for nights of peaceful sleep.

- I have been reminded again that trauma is not linear. Instead of taking a straight path where it slowly fades into the sunset, the effects of the trauma come back and surprise me. I have felt like I've been keeping it together pretty well, all things considered. It seemed right that I would take the lead in communicating and following up with insurance, ServePro and others since I have been on summer break and Henrik has been at work. That is changing as I head back to school, and Henrik is more free during the week. I feel like I'm handing over the baton, and Henrik feels like he's been out of the loop. One day recently, as we talked, Henrik said, "If I were you I would..." and "You should call Donna (our State Farm adjuster) and ask her...." I felt like I was trying to pass the baton, had tripped and the baton was being fumbled. "Henrik, I have been trying to juggle all these conversations and decisions while you have been working. I need help! I need your help!" I may have also added that I was starting to feel a bit resentful that he went into work the day of the fire, and left me there alone to deal with the enormity of what had just happened. I was on a roll and it felt like I was back at the beginning. Fatigue again. I feel that an event like this can make you or break you. We have chosen to let God use this to make us stronger, more compassionate, and more grace-filled with ourselves and each other.
- This is a silly one. (Sorry!) I had thought that one of the few things I wanted in my "new" house was a refrigerator with an ice maker. We'd never had one. I'm re-thinking that as we have an ice maker where we currently live. They take a lot of freezer space, and can be a little persnickety. I think I may go for simple. What do you think?







*Another very successful produce distribution to report:
“DRIVE THROUGH” free produce distribution on August 11, 2020.*

Free Produce was distributed on Tues. August 11, 2020. We served our highest number of guests in the nearly five years we have been doing this. 213 families received fresh produce on August 11th. It was gratifying to see so many cars lined up in our West parking lot. We received 6000# of bulk produce that needed to be bagged and prepared to deliver to our drive through guests. We also received 200 pre-packaged dairy boxes which were filled with a gallon of white milk, a gallon of chocolate milk, a pound of butter, a large container of cottage cheese, shredded cheese and some yogurt. We are blessed to be able to continue this missional endeavor, and I am thankful for the 39 volunteers who helped in August. It got a little crazy at times as we continue to tweak our process of moving people through the parking lots.

Note: Drive thru distribution and pre packaging is great for this project! We cannot always count on the pre-packaging being available, but we are blessed to be able to offer this to our community, and it is at NO FINANCIAL COST to us at FELC.

Our next Produce Distribution will be Tuesday, September 8, 2020 11:00 to 1:00.

This week, with the help of Angie Cockrell's design of a new post card, five of us gathered to hand address "We Miss You" postcards to folks that we haven't seen back at worship. It is simply an engagement, letting people know that we **truly do miss them**. Most of us are hoping these COVID19 days will soon be over. I suggest that we don't hold our breath!
