



Pastor's Pieces

For September

First, let me give a loud shout-out to everyone for all the prayers, cards, and well-wishes during my recent illness. I'm like everyone else I know: I hate being sick! It happens, and God has at least three things in mind for letting illness occur: 1) taking away our pride, fostering humility; 2) providing the care and love and encouragement we need, and 3) drawing us ever more closely to His side as the true source of all strength. So, thank you, First English family, and praise to God for healing.

When I attended the NALC Convocation, I picked up a few books from the Concordia display (no surprise there!), including 2 volumes entitled, "Eternal Anthems". I have always loved hearing the stories behind the writing of our hymns, and these volumes are a delight I want to share with you from time to time. The first, one of most Lutherans' all-time favorites: "A Mighty Fortress is Our God". Below is an early English translation to the first 2 stanzas:

A mighty fortress is our God,
A trust shield and weapon;
He helps us free from ev'ry need
That hath us now o'ertaken.
The old evil foe
Now means deadly woe;
Deep guile and great might
Are his dread arms in fight;
On earth is not his equal.

With might of ours can naught be done,
Soon were our loss effected;
But for us fights the valiant One,
Whom God Himself elected.
Ask ye, Who is this?
Jesus Christ it is,
Of Sabaoth Lord,
And there's none other God;
He holds the field forever.

Most likely written between 1527 and 1529, history records an epidemic that hit Wittenberg during that time, and during which time Martin Luther suffered a serious illness. Also, Turkish forces were threatening the German borders as well as Catholic armies. The faithful band of "Lutherans" were under attack theologically from both Catholics and more radical Protestants. Nevertheless, when this hymn was published, it was under the designation: "A Hymn of Comfort". Perhaps you will enjoy comparing the above words with the translation in our current hymnals.

Praise God for all our rich musical heritage, and for the faithful men and women who have shared these gifts with us. Let them encourage and inspire you.

The meeting was called to order by Council President Cindy Russell at 7:00 PM

Devotion and prayer led by Lu Blankenship.

Secretary, Christopher Kaschube:

• Electronically presented the FELC Church Council minutes from the July 18 meeting for approval. **MOTION** (Alicia/Sandie) to approve the minutes of the meeting. **MOTION APPROVED.**

Executive Committee: Cindy Russell asked that we set a date for the congregational meeting to address the antiphonal organ request for repair. That date will be Sunday, September 24, 2023 following worship. **MOTION** (Jan/Chris C.) **MOTION APPROVED.**

Evangelism Committee, Alicia Schultz:

- Committee members continue to correspond with shut-ins, correspond with guests, as appropriate, and be attentive to regular members and attendees who have been missing multiple Sundays. Jan will be reporting on the Produce Distribution and senior boxes. I can't help but be proud to be part of a congregation with so many hard working and faithful volunteers as these events require. Myself, I continue to ponder what is expected of me and of FELC members regarding evangelism responsibilities. Our bylaws' description of the responsibilities of the evangelism committee begin (after which there is more) this way: "(a) equip members to witness to their faith in daily life; (b) equip members to invite others into the fellowship of the church." This notion of witnessing to our faith seems to harmonize perfectly with our mission of "Pointing People to Jesus Through Intentional Relationships', which all harmonizes perfectly with the NALC focus on discipleship. But though we engage in many worthwhile activities in this congregation, it seems there could be more pointing to Jesus, more building of intentional relationships, more discipling in and through these many activities. Working on that. Please share ideas.
- Report on August 8, 2023 Free Produce distribution: We served 253 guests, our second highest day in the past nine years. There were 54 new families served. The need for food is huge.

Global Missions Committee, Chris Cichanowicz:

Malawi:

- Pastor Andy and Joy attended the NALC Convocation to help keep the momentum for MOCP going.
- The Kanyenyeva Wala is maintaining high standard quality products in their kits for women.
- The well project is complete. They will soon dig the septic tank and install the plumbing system for the guest toilet in the Skills Building.
- They plan to install the maize mill by the end of August.
- The visit of the Westwood Community Mission team was very successful! It included a VBS for the kids, a business training for 60 participants, and a "Pop-up" clinic. They managed to see over 400 men and women and over 700 of the MOCP registered children. A huge success and much needed!

Peru:

The Far Side:

 No update, but continue prayers that more Islanders will be willing to do comprehension test reading of translated Scripture drafts.

 - The ELC campers sang for our Wednesday lunch group 3 times this summer. It was very well received by both the campers and the visitors. We would like to continue this ministry next summer. The campers also were very involved in chapel all summer long. They were in charge of the puppets during music time, they acted out Bible skits and assisted with the felt board while learning a story.
 - Rachel Justice led a wonderful art program with the ELC this summer. They completed 4 projects related to the Gospel under her direction, and all of the art was displayed in the narthex for our congregation to enjoy. The kids even got to visit Mosaic and see how a kiln works!
 - The campers finished up their summer music time at the ELC by going to Wedgewood Estates and singing all of the songs they had learned for the residents on Tuesday, August 8th.
- Submitted by Angle Murphy:
 - We have had one teacher, Sam Smith, leave this month. Two teachers went back to teaching at their schools and will continue to work several nights a week for us, and one additional teacher will be going back to high school.
 - We will be closed Sept 1st for a teacher workday.
 - I would like to thank Becky Pittman and Rachel Justice for creating a wonderful Christian summer art program. The children really loved this and have made some beautiful projects!

Stewardship Committee, Sandie Volz: Nothing to report

Worship Committee, Jan Fisher:

- The main focus of our July meeting was to further discuss the antiphonal organ and the presentation to the congregation. We also are aware that a date needs to be set for the special congregation meeting.
- We also discussed the suggestion of providing communion cards in the pews to get a better number of persons attending communion and worship. After discussion we decided that establishing a QR code for that purpose might be the best option. Becky will pursue this with Nicole. We also discussed the meaning of the word "catholic in lower case" in the Apostles Creed. Some do not realize that catholic means "universal", and Beth Harruff mentioned that a visitor thought that it meant that we are part of the Catholic church. We need to ask Martin Luther how he feels about that! Just kidding! Becky will pursue adding an asterisk notation that refers to "universal." We plan to continue with plans for the "Framed Cross" project, thinking that September will be a good time to launch that initiative.

- We seem to be very consistent in our Sunday worship numbers throughout the summer. The average seems to be 85 to 100, depending on the Sunday. I feel that this is very promising and we should be proud of this consistency. We are blessed to have Pastor Lisa with us on three out of four Sundays. We continue to have visitors and Alicia's team makes every effort to make connections.
- In September we will have Pastor Kim Mauer preaching on Sunday September 10, 2023.
- We have plans to "surprise" the congregation with WWJD bracelets on Sunday, Sept. 17, 2023.
 Pastor Lisa will be preaching that day and this will fit with her sermon topic.

Women's Ministry, Jan Fisher:

- Newly formed Book Club begins on Sunday, September 10 at 2:00 PM in Emmaus Room. We will be reading "This Tender Land" written by William Kent Krueger. Open to all.
- As reported last month, Bible Study begins on Monday, September 11 at 1:00 PM, all women are encouraged to join with us and increase their spiritual growth.
- The Women's Ministry served a very nice funeral meal to the family and friends of Pastor Tim Storms. I am thankful for all those volunteers who supplied food and/or helped to serve the guests.

Social Ministry Committee, Gary Lane:

- We continue to give out Senior Boxes, Produce and Cheese. This month was 94.
- Wednesday Noon Lunch surged to 80 grilled burgers given outdoors.
- Vacation Bible School was held on July 17,18, & 19. It was a joint venture with FELC, Kingdom Grace, and Holy Trinity. The average attendance was 55.
- We are anticipating a good turnout for the Auto Show in August.

Property Committee, Mike Anderson:

Worner Roofing is coming to do replacement of shingles. They will be bringing a man-lift. Terry
Brown, Richland Renovating Co. has given us a bid of \$24,000 to paint the exterior trim around the
church. Andy is working diligently to coordinate the use of the man-lift among the vendors who will
be working on exterior paint, roofing issues, and stained glass window replacement. Thus we will
not be paying twice for that piece of equipment. MOTION (Mike/Gary) to accept this bid. MOTION

• Earlier in the month a Church Council e-vote was held to approve a **RECOMMENDATION** to approve Faith Williams' resignation, and to hire Angie Cockrell Mullins as our Parish Secretary. **RECOMMENDATION APPROVED**.

A brief report about the events of the NALC convocation:

August 8 to 11, 2023, attended by Lu Blankenship and Jan Fisher. Early in the week there were over 600 attendees because some were there for the Women's Annual Meeting, etc.. By the time we got to the voting portion, we were down to around 450 to 475. At present the NALC has 490 congregations, soon to become 500 as a number of churches are moving away from ELCA and coming to a more conservative denomination. The NALC is alive and well! It's exciting to hear of our growth.

Each morning we began with Bible Study led by Dr. David Luy, Associate Professor at NALS. He was dynamic! The overall focus of the convocation was mission (local and international) and discipleship. We heard missional messages from Rev. Dr. Gemechis Bubba, Rev. David Wendel, and others. We were allowed to choose two "workshop" sessions led by ordained specialists in those chosen areas.

One that Lu and Jan both attended spoke of various ways to enhance our church's visibility in a digital world and offered strategies for renewal and growth in our congregations. We will be sharing this with the appropriate staff and council members.

We heard about the 2024 National Youth Gathering.

We heard from Rev. Dr. Eric Riesen, President of NALS about the wonderful successes happening in seminary. We heard about the exciting growth of the NALS seminary and some of the options provided to those who might feel a call to serve Jesus. There are 130 individuals in the pipeline who are seeking to become Pastors, Worship Leaders, Youth workers, and even though our Lutheran standards are high, there is financial assistance available. And there are many online courses. We met a number of Pastors who have recently been ordained in the NALC, following their call to ministry in Christ Jesus.

We were encouraged to get our congregations and individuals to contribute financially to the "2020 Vision; Today, Tomorrow, and Forever." The goal is to raise \$5M and presently over \$2M has been raised or pledged. This initiative is in place to further the growth of the NALC.

The election of Bishop became a re-election of Bishop Dan Selbo, passing on the first and only vote for that position. Other voting covered the Court of Adjudication, and Executive Council.



Lu and I both brought home some explanation booklets in case anyone is interested in establishing a legacy.



2023 Convocation Information

Lu Blankenship and Jan Fisher, FELC Delegates are happy to share "Lutheran Week 2023 Convocation" information: (copied from the NALC website)

Oklahoma City, OK: In a significant show of unity and trust, delegates of the North American Lutheran Church (NALC) have re-elected the Rev. Dr. Daniel W. Selbo as their bishop during the NALC Mission Convocation in Oklahoma City, OK. Receiving 77% of votes on the first ballot, Bishop Selbo's re-election stands as a testament to his unwavering commitment, strong leadership, and vision for the church's future. The announcement of his re-election was made by NALC General Secretary, the Rev. Dr. Amy Little on Thursday, August 10, 2023.

Bishop Selbo has been a pivotal figure in the NALC, previously serving as the pastor of St. Timothy's Lutheran Church in San Jose, California and holding the position of dean of the Central Pacific Mission District. His continued leadership as bishop reaffirms the trust and confidence of the congregations and mission districts across North America.

The Mission Convocation was graced by a plethora of over 600 global delegates and visitors. This broad spectrum of attendees included representatives from various global Lutheran bodies and renowned ecumenical partners. Notably present were the Rev. Dr. Yonas Yigezu Dibisa (Ethiopian Evangelical Lutheran Church Mekane Yesus), the Rev. Dr. Joel Lehenbauer (Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod), the Most Rev. Dr. Ray Sutton of the Reformed Episcopal Church (Anglican Church in North America), and the Rev. Dr. Walter F. Kedjierski (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops). Through the NALC's participation in the Global Confessional and Missional Lutheran Forum, other church leaders and representatives were present from Denmark, Finland, Germany, India, Laos, Mongolia, Norway, and Tanzania.

Adding to the sentiment of unity and global outreach, a video greeting was shared with attendees from the Rev. Dr. Scott Jones, a bishop of the emerging Global Methodist Church, which resonated with warmth and camaraderie.

Especially touching was the contextual background of Bishop Selbo's early ministry. Having served as a vicar in South Africa, his roots in global mission made the global participation and musical segments of the Mission Convocation even more poignant, symbolizing the intertwining of cultures, faith, and the universal message of Jesus Christ.

Upon addressing the congregation, Bishop Selbo's words resonated with gratitude, vision, and a roadmap for the years ahead. He extensively spotlighted the North American Lutheran Seminary, underlining its crucial role in raising the next generation of pastoral candidates. He called for a renewed, invigorated focus on mission, discipleship, and spiritual renewal, emphasizing the continuation and evolution of the NALC's 20/20 Vision.

Bishop Selbo stated, "The North American Lutheran Church, over the years, has become a beacon of hope, faith, and spiritual resilience. As we move forward into the future together, our

mission remains firmly anchored in the teachings and love of Christ, and our enduring commitment to discipleship, both locally and globally. I am profoundly honored by this re-election and the immense trust placed in me. My earnest prayer is that together, as one unified body, we will continue to participate in the mission and work of God by lifting up Jesus as Lord and Savior of all, that the world might be drawn by the Holy Spirit to Him."

The North American Lutheran Church, through its rich history and tradition, has cemented its role as a pivotal pillar in the global Lutheran tradition. With congregations spread across North America, the NALC stands as a testament to the strength, unity, and faith of the Lutheran tradition. Centered around the life-changing Gospel of Jesus Christ, the church remains steadfast in its commitment to discipleship, evangelism, and the good news of Jesus Christ.

Also adding to the global character of the Mission Convocation was the commissioning of six new global workers dedicated to the cause of spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ around the world. Among these newly commissioned workers was Randy Stubbs, who, in addition to his service commitment, plays a vital role at Tumaini University in Makumira, Tanzania. Randy, along with his two talented daughters, graced the Convocation with an assortment of hymns and songs from various corners of the globe. Their musical leadership and performance served as a rich tapestry of global faith and culture, beautifully weaving into the fabric of the NALC's commitment to worldwide evangelism and discipleship.

Underpinning the NALC's ethos are its four foundational Core Values: Christ Centered, Mission Driven, Traditionally Grounded, and Congregation-ally Focused. These values serve as the bedrock upon which the church operates, guiding its decisions and spiritual direction.

In a world fraught with challenges, the NALC continues to shine as a beacon of faith and hope. It is a dynamic and renewed Lutheran community, fervently moving forward in faith, focused on living out Christ's Great Commission to evangelize and make disciples both in North America and around the globe.

Antiphonal Organ Relocation to 3rd Floor Balcony Area

In the coming months, there will be discussion about the possible project of relocating the Antiphonal Organ from its current space in the attic, to the 3rd floor balcony area. We are already blessed with an extremely generous donation of \$25,000, that has already been given towards the project! The primary reason for pursuing this project, is for improved longevity of the Antiphonal Division of the organ. It is currently located in a small room up in the attic that sees extremely high temperatures. The high temperatures, over time, will cause accelerated deterioration of critical components in the organ, mainly any and all things leather. Wood can be affected too though, and failure in wood parts could also be a problem. The high temperatures in the Antiphonal Organ will, at some point, cause it to become unplayable. The leather components will over time become brittle, and eventually fail.

Tuning, though it has nothing to do with longevity of the organ, is also a constant battle. This again, is due to the high temperatures in the division. The Antiphonal Division is out of tune more than it is in tune. This issue would be largely resolved with relocation to the 3rd floor. It would then be at the same footing that the main organ is, which would be wonderfully advantageous.

While these are the largest issues that the Antiphonal Organ faces, there are also numerous other musical improvements that would be realized with this project as well. In the coming weeks, there will be a document made available in the narthex that will in more detail outline the issues already mentioned here, but it will also speak to the numerous additional musical benefits that this project would achieve.

FINANCE AND STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE UPDATES



It will soon be time to develop the budget for 2024. We, of course, review the church finances every month. In **July, the church income was \$24,371**; while **expenses were \$41,575**. This is pretty typical. In general, we **spend approximately \$20,000 per month more than we receive**. As of July, the church (excluding the ELC) was averaging \$23,026 in monthly receipts and \$45,688 in expenses. This is why we use funds every year from the General Endowment Fund just to meet budget. For 2023, the amount allowed by the rules of the endowment fund was

\$103,940; however, we (Council and Congregation) allowed an additional withdrawal of \$100,000 if needed. Due to major repairs required to maintain our church building (stained glass windows, elevator, roof, exterior trim, air conditioning for third floor, etc.), these funds will be needed. The other thing we need to keep in mind is that we are not currently paying a full-time pastor, and hopefully we will have a regular pastor in the coming year.

Back in 2018, we borrowed from the General Endowment Fund for Renewing God's House. We still **owe \$200,000** on that loan, which we have been paying at a rate of about \$900 per month. The good news is that the General Endowment Fund was \$2,286,840 at the end of 2022. As of July 31, it was up to \$2,348,310, a **gain of over \$61,000**. As of the end of July, we had withdrawn \$50,000; and we are taking another draw in August.

Also of good news is that the congregation approved a withdrawal of up to \$200,000 if needed for the stained glass windows. To date, we have managed to pay the invoices for these without taking that draw. The windows are being reinstalled, the elevator project has begun, and the roof repairs and exterior trim painting will be done soon. Hopefully, all this will come in under \$200,000, but this is all beyond normal budgeted property expenses.

Huge kudos to Andy Kershaw!!! He has managed to save the church significant money by coordinating projects so that the same lifts and scaffolding can be used for multiple projects.

As always, please let me know of any questions or concerns regarding the church finances.

Kroger Community Rewards and Wednesday Community Lunch

During the Covid restrictions, the Wednesday lunches were served in "to go" containers, which significantly increased expenses. Now, the number of folks attending is increasing. Nicole, our Finance Director, recommended that we begin adding to the Lunch Fund, which is about \$4,755, by directing the Kroger Rewards to that fund rather than the Malawi Orphan Care Pro-



ject. Since we give significantly to the MOCP from our benevolence and a special offering, Council agreed to this change. In the second quarter, this income was about \$200. Currently, the lunch costs about \$200 per occurrence. We currently have 44 families enrolled in Kroger Community Rewards. You can go on line and search for Kroger Community Rewards and check to see if you are enrolled. Then you can make sure your rewards are linked to First English Lutheran Church (FY153). If you are not enrolled, you should be able to enroll on this site. If you need help, ask someone at church to help you. Most young people should be able to help. Thank you!






Take it to the Lord first!




